KEYWEST - The conditions were perfect Saturday for the 39th annual Swim Around Key West.

Powder blue skies and calm emerald seas greeted nearly 160 swimmers and support kayaks for the 12.5-mile course that started and finished at Smathers Beach.

Seth Kurtz of Lexington, South Carolina swam to first place overall in a time of 4:20:59, five minutes ahead of Miami resident Eric Sullivan, who finished with a time of 4:26. It was the exact time Sullivan swam in the event two years ago.

The quiet high school junior at Lexington High said it was a good day for the swim, but he struggled three-quarters of the way through the course.

"Coming around mile nine I was swimming in like 6 inches of water, so I was pulling to the side and not over the top. It was really hard," Kurtz said. "It seemed shorter than I thought it would be. I thought it would be longer.
